

REPORT TO CORE AREA LIQUID WASTE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE MEETING OF WEDNESDAY 13 MAY 2009

SUBJECT FIRST NATIONS ENGAGEMENT UPDATE – CORE AREA WASTEWATER TREATMENT PROJECT

PURPOSE

To update the Core Area Liquid Waste Management Committee (CALWMC) on First Nations engagement for the wastewater treatment project.

BACKGROUND

The Capital Regional District (CRD) has been pursuing engagement with First Nations potentially affected by the wastewater treatment project. Common law consultation obligations rest with the provincial and federal governments; however the CRD can be delegated certain aspects of that consultative process. With that in mind, the CRD has entered into a tripartite Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the provincial government and each of the Songhees, Esquimalt and Beecher Bay Nations which require the CRD to keep the First Nation well informed, gather information on their interests, use that information in the design of the project where practical, and refer unresolved issues back to the province.

The status of First Nations engagement to date is outlined in the attached chart (Appendix A). So far, First Nations feedback on the project has been limited to general interests given that the project has not yet proceeded to a point where specific sewage facility sites or outfall locations are being discussed. The MOU also contains a commitment that the CRD and the First Nations will use the wastewater project as an opportunity to address long-standing relationship issues. To date, much of the face-to-face time for project discussion with First Nations has been spent on these relationship issues with the goal of improving CRD credibility in anticipation of more substantive discussions on the wastewater project this summer and fall.

The CRD has also been updating First Nations not expected to have interests affected by the project, such as the Tsawout Nation, in the event it becomes apparent that its' interests may indeed be affected.

Finally, the CRD has been working with federal agencies such as Transport Canada and the Department of National Defense, to attempt to develop a common understanding of how the CRD will work with them to satisfy consultation obligations with First Nations. Federal agencies are not prepared to enter into an MOU concerning consultation until it is apparent that a decision will be made by their department that could affect First Nations interests; however, they have been clear that they fully intend to be responsible for those consultation obligations. This is consistent with the CRD goal of ensuring that the obligations for consultation are met by the appropriate agency.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Core Area Liquid Waste Management Committee receive this report for information.
