#### 8. CORRESPONDENCE

a) Les Haddad, President – Healthy Choices Inspire Youth Society
The Society requests the donation of a free swim for approximately 40 campers involved in the Dry Father's Day Campout at the Sooke Community Flats on June 16, 2012.

#### 11. STAFF REPORTS

#### a) Staff News

#### Staffing

Summer camp staff have been hired. All but one staff member are returning or current SEAPARC employees.

#### **Programs**

The lacrosse program has been enthusiastically received with over 45 children currently registered in twice a week classes until the end of June. The Recreation Program Coordinator would like to thank all the staff and Rotary members involved in setting up this program.

#### Administration

#### **SEAPARC Bus Tender**

Staff have decided not to pursue acquisition of a new 24 passenger bus at this time. Two reasons for this decision were outlined by the SEAPARC Manager:

- 1. The high cost of purchasing a new vehicle is considered prohibitive at this time;
- Current limits on usage of the bus for the benefit of the community as a whole is an issue. The SEAPARC Manager and the Manager of Parks and Community Services are reviewing the matter.

A bus will be rented for the summer camp season at a cost of approximately \$5,000 per month plus the cost of fuel and insurance. Staff will continue to pursue the purchase of an appropriate late model bus or passenger van.

#### Ice Allocation Meeting

Chairman Perkins, Commissioners Berger and Bishop will represent the Commission as observers at the May 8<sup>th</sup> Ice Allocation meeting. A Staff Report will be presented to the Commission at the June meeting.

#### b) Memo/Presentation – Fees & Charges Policy Review

The SEAPARC Manager reviewed the goals and objectives of the Fees and Charges policy. 2011 operating subsidies and recovery rates of Greater Victoria and CRD recreational facilities were compared. The Program Services Manager outlined the number of low-cost and no-cost programs and events offered by SEAPARC.

General discussion followed including the following points:

- SEAPARC's subsidy is well-spent in contributing to the quality of life of area residents and in attracting new residents;
- Sooke's population base differs from most communities with a number of first time home buyers and young families moving to the community;
- The facility offers many free or discounted programs for those who cannot afford regular admission fees;
- Increases should be kept within the cost of living increase and prices should approach the CRD average;
- SEAPARC's current admission rates are low in comparison to other facilities;
- Our core mandate is to get more people using the facility;
- There are currently too many pass and membership offerings;
- Discounted admission rates should be based on need not arbitrary age classifications;
- The LIFE program provides participants with 52 free admission passes and reduced program fees. SEAPARC currently has approximately 350 LIFE participants.

Staff will present a report at the June Commission meeting which will provide several options for admission fees and suggestions for improving accessibility for all residents.

Commissioner Grove suggested that while it may not be feasible at this time to build a full gym, it may be possible to install several exercise machines in existing areas. He noted that the installation of bar-like seating along the pool window could free up enough space for several types of training machines.

#### What

Additional or new storage area for Sooke & District Minor Hockey (S&DMHA).

#### **Where**

I am asking that S &DMH have the area indicated in red at the South end of the arena to place a 10'X20' Sea Container for proper storage of equipment.

#### Why


The current position under the bleachers given to S&DMHA is inadequate in many ways. With the current configuration, it is literally back breaking work to be under the bleachers for any period of time and this is normally at the beginning of the season when handing out the gear and upon return (usually two week period). The storage area is also too small to properly store all of the equipment. I currently have a few sets of jerseys and goalie gear home because there is inadequate space to store them. It is such a small area that safety may become an issue as the sprinkler head for the fitted fire fighting system is in jeopardy of being within the 18" allowed.

- 1. My plan is too acquire a sea container and place it in the area indicated on drawing supplied. This will allow for the proper storage of jerseys and goalie gear owned by S&DMHA at the same time opening the area under the bleachers for any one else wishing to utilize it allowing us to access the facility without having to bother arena staff. S &DMH will eat any cost acquired for this move with S &DMH maintaining it to the high standards expected from any municipal building.
- 2. Second recommendation would be to have the south end corner inside the arena under the clock to enclose with a cage or other means of securing the equipment.

If approved, this move will cause little or no impact to the patronage of the facility.

**SUBJECT** Computer Replacement Policy

#### **PURPOSE/ISSUE**

To clarify the CRD's computer replacement policy.

#### BACKGROUND

At the April meeting the Commission asked Staff to provide background information on the CRD's computer replacement policy. The following information was provided by David Hennigan, Senior Manager – Information Technology:

Depending on the actual use of the computers the replacement varies between three to five years. Some computers have a more demanding processing requirement then others (like water modelling software, network predictive analysis, GIS and AutoCAD software applications) these are replaced every 3 years. Computers that have less processing demands are replaced every 4 years and computers which are used sporadically and for monitoring are replaced about every 5 years.

The reasons for replacement with in those time lines are:

- To ensure consistent operation, minimizing staff downtime and productivity loss;
- To operate with manufacturer warranty periods avoiding costly repairs outside of the warranty period;
- When the cost of repairs/upgrades exceeds or approaches the cost of replacement;
- To ensure the organization is operating a standard computer configuration. It is more cost effective to support a standard hardware and software configuration; it is more costly to support multiple hardware and software configurations;
- To ensure computers can operate the latest versions of the business applications required by the business unit;
- To ensure the computer hardware and components are supported by the computer operating system;
- To ensure computers can meet the software manufacturer's minimum operating specification;
- To minimize technical support and repair costs. This is a balance between the mean time between failures of the various components, the cost of technical support and the cost of repairs the longer hardware is operating the more likely it is to fail.

**PURPOSE/ISSUE:** Information

#### **SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS:**

#### **Facilities**

#### Pool Shutdown

The pool will be shut down from June 18 to July 1 for annual maintenance. During this period the following maintenance projects will be undertaken:

- Multi-Purpose Rooms: paint walls, sand and refinish floor
- <u>Pool Basement:</u> service all pumps and install new acid lines to all 3 pools
- Change Rooms: install grab Bars, paint and caulk showers
- Leisure Pool and Deck: warranty tile work: Perma Construction
- Lap Pool: main drain tile repair
- Hot Tub: repair of jets
- Sauna: wall and bench maintenance
- Air Handling: duct cleaning Avis Power Vacuum
- Parking Lot- line painting Scho's Line Painting

Staff training sessions and events during shutdown will include a program staff workshop, first aid/safety training and a staff social event (Langford Lanes bowling night).

#### Grab Bar Installation

Staff have received a quotation to install grab bars in all three change rooms and the individual stalls in the family change room. The price is \$2,197.58. It is recommended that \$2,200 be allocated from the Pool Capital Reserve fund to install grab bars in all three change rooms. Work to be completed during the annual shutdown.

#### Administration

#### **BCRPA** Conference

Six staff and the Commission Chair attended the BCRPA conference held in Victoria last month. One of the sessions, led by Brian Johnston, principal of Professional Environmental Recreation Consultants (PERC) provided an overview of the National Recreation Agenda project.

Mr. Johnston noted that in October, 2011 two hundred recreational professionals from across Canada gathered with the goal of creating a national agenda which will provide guidance and set priorities for the recreation sector in the next ten years.

Some of the highlights of the plenary session include the following:

- A "Definition of Recreation";
- 12 priorities of the National Recreation Agenda project;
- "In essence we grow people, build community and conserve our environment";
- Outcome Driven:
  - The private sector is demand driven. It focusses on direct benefits to users, and measures costs and benefits in dollars.
  - The public sector is needs driven. It focusses on indirect benefits to all (which is the definition of public good) and measures costs and benefits in units of social value. These social outcomes drive our efforts.
- Relevant and Compelling:
  - Health and healthcare, wellness, education, the justice system, and social services
  - Sport, recreation, active living, fitness, culture and the arts
  - Solving Wicked Problems;
  - We have to create a conceptual nexus of support without decision makers

**SUBJECT:** Ice Allocation: 2012/2013 Season

#### **PURPOSE/ISSUE:**

To recommend ice allocation for the 2012/2013 season.

#### **HISTORY/BACKGROUND:**

Staff conducted an Ice Allocation meeting on Tuesday, May 8 to review requests for the 2012-2013 ice season. Chairman Perkins and Commissioner Bishop attended the meeting as observers. Meeting notes and a proposed ice schedule are attached as background information.

The SEAPARC Manager presented a generic weekly schedule along with special events and tournament dates. It was proposed that additional ice time be offered to Sooke Minor Hockey to accommodate game slots in accordance with league requirements and to facilitate juvenile hockey teams (ages 18 to 20). Minor schedule adjustments were discussed with meeting attendees.

It was noted that an extra .5 hour was requested for SEAPARC programs on Sunday mornings and that Journey Middle School requested an additional 2.5 hours. The Wednesday morning traditional ice slot for an "Everyone Welcome" skate was adjusted to accommodate Journey's request.

A request for a hockey school using 24 hours of ice time from August 20-24 has not been accommodated at this time due to limited demand. August 27-31 has been offered in its place. The Facilities Operations Supervisor will speak to the challenges and costs of putting the ice in by August 19 versus August 26.

Three ice slots remain available for school use and/or program development. Whereas available public ice time is limited, a commitment for a private 2 hour rental has not yet been finalized.

A review of Greater Victoria prime rental rates suggest \$210.72 per hour is the average rental rate. A 2.5% increase in rates would result in a prime rental rate of \$205.00.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

- 1. Approve the generic weekly schedule and recommended adjustments for special events, tournaments and additional game ice for Sooke Minor Hockey.
- 2. Approve the proposed ice rental rate for 2012/2013.
- 3. Do not approve the schedule and adjustments as presented.
- 4. Do not approve the ice rental rate as recommended.

#### **IMPLICATIONS:**

The suggested schedule and adjustments offer a fair and consistent allocation of ice time to arena contract users in accordance with Commission policy.

Ice time for the 2012/2013 season is booked to near capacity.

## STAFF REPORT TO THE SOOKE & ELECTORAL AREA PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION MEETING OF WEDNESDAY, JUNE 6, 2012

**SUBJECT:** Proposed Fees and Charges

#### **PURPOSE/ISSUE:**

This report contains the analysis and recommendations regarding proposed fee increases and amendments to the Recreation Services and Facilities Fees and Charges Bylaw, effective September 1, 2012.

#### **HISTORY/BACKGROUND:**

The last adjustment to the fees and charges was July 1, 2010, with the implementation of HST.

Most of the Greater Victoria region's municipal recreation departments' fees are adjusted in September. Once approved, the fees and charges document is forwarded to CRD Finance department for endorsement by the CRD Board.

The annual process for reviewing fees and charges includes consideration of:

- Past and actual budgeted expenses and revenues
- Activity and usage levels
- Recognition of desired recovery rates and operational deficits
- Operational assumptions regarding access, facility enhancements and recovery
- Fees and charges at other municipal recreation departments
- Previous year's fee increases
- Economic times
- Discussions with key user groups

The primary consideration in the review of recreation fees and charges is to find a balance between fiscal accountability, access to recreation services, and the marketplace.

The review process is also consistent with SEAPARC's Fees and Charges Policy:

- Fees should be based on recovery of direct costs.
- Fees should encourage maximum public participation and minimize the tax subsidy.
- Registrants should be responsible for financially contributing to their recreation activity.
- Fees for youth and children should be lower than those for adult and senior whenever possible.
- Fees for commercial users should be higher than adult users.
- Fees for non-prime time use should be discounted.

Appendix A is a summary of fees and charges at all municipal recreation departments in the Greater Victoria region. Appendix B is a summary of drop-in admission fees and age categories at municipal recreation departments in other regions in the province. It is difficult to make exact comparisons due to the different fee structures and discounts that are offered.

Staff have made several considerations when proposing fee increases for 2012-2013:

- SEAPARC drop-in admission fees are lower than the average regional rates.
- The regional averages are calculated based on current fees and not what recreation departments might charge in the future.
- The Commission has indicated satisfaction that SEAPARC fees and charges are lower than the regional average.

To assist and ensure that financial accessibility needs of the community are met, staff continue to encourage and assist the community in utilizing the Leisure Involvement for Everyone (L.I.F.E.) Program. This program is designed to provide access to recreational services through funding support for qualified individuals and families. SEAPARC is also part of many regional initiatives that encourage and support access to recreation – these include Coast Capital Savings sponsored free swims and skates and the Canadian Tire Jumpstart program. Appendix C is a summary of all heavily subsidized programs, services, and special events.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

- That the Commission approves the recommended fee adjustments and age categories as outlined in this report.
- That the Commission approves the recommended fee adjustments and age categories with some exceptions.
- That the Commission maintains the fee structure and age categories at current levels.

#### **IMPLICATIONS:**

- Utility costs and staffing costs have increased and increased fees are required to help offset these costs.
- The proposed adjustments to the fees, assuming constant attendance and sales, would result in an approximate revenue increase of \$5,000.
- The price of some services may be considered "elastic". That is, as price increases, demand goes down. In tough economic times, fee increases do not always produce increased revenue.
- Failure to meet revenue projections, for whatever reason, may result in a greater reliance on the tax requisition.
- Keeping fees relatively low increases participation in physical and leisure activity.

#### **SUMMARY/CONCLUSION:**

An overall increase of 2.5% - 5% is recommended. A 2.5% - 3% increase for programs, admissions and rentals is estimated to appropriate <u>only</u> the increase in negotiated staff pay schedules.

Below is a rationale summary for the increased fees for 2012-2013.

- Increased admission fees and rental rates are required to keep minimal pace with increases in expenditures.
- Recreation is somewhat of a social service and the Commission's Fees and Charges Policy attempts to make these services as accessible as reasonably possible.

- The proposed changes will streamline our offerings and address the principles of the Commission's Fees and Charges Policy.
- SEAPARC will continue to implement strategies to address its primary goal of ensuring access for all.

Appendix D provides a summary of the proposed changes to the current fees and charges. Appendix E is a final version of the fee adjustments to be presented to the Capital Regional District Board for approval.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the Commission recommends to the Capital Regional District Board that fees and charges in Appendix E be approved effective September 1, 2012.

#### Proposed Changes (effective September 1, 2012)

1. SEAPARC drop-in fees have been compared to the regional average. These fees were not increased in 2011, due to the implementation of the HST in 2010. The proposed increase will bring the fees closer to the regional average, while keeping pace with increasing costs.

Staff propose a \$0.22 increase (4.3%) to the adult admission fee. All other admission fees will be adjusted based on the approved fee structure.

2. SEAPARC passes and membership options have been reviewed with the intent to realign the number of options offered.

There are currently two (2) "per visit" pass options (10x and 25x visit passes). Only 12% of the total passes sold were 25-visit passes. The elimination of the 25-visit pass will simplify administration and maintain our fees at one of the most affordable in the region. We will continue to offer 10x visit pass options for all age groups.

There are currently three (3) "membership" options (1-month, 3-month, and 12-month). Only 25% of the total memberships sold were 3-month memberships. The elimination of the 3-month pass will simplify administration and maintain our fees at one of the most affordable in the region. We also offer monthly payment plan options for 12-month memberships. We will continue to offer 1-month and 12-month membership options for all age groups.

3. SEAPARC age categories have been reviewed to ensure consistency in the delivery of services and to ensure access for all.

The current fees and charges document has a student rate (13-18 years). There is no fee structure for adult students 19 years and older. Staff recommend creating a post-secondary student rate for adult students 19-25 years. Staff also recommend changing the age structure for children and youth and provide discounted rates accordingly. Changing the age structure will provide a fair and reasonable means of fee adjustments. Children 4 years and under will be considered preschool. The age for children will be 5-12 years and the age for youth will be 13-18 years. Individuals 19 years and older will be considered adult. Individuals 65 years and older will be considered senior.
