#### a) Staff News

#### **Programs**

#### **Events**

The annual Easter Eggstravaganza was held Saturday, April 4<sup>th</sup>. 450 people attended, including 250 children and over \$460 was raised for the Sooke Food Bank, along with a large amount of food donations. The annual SEAPARC Community Garage Sale took place April 18<sup>th</sup>. 70 tables were sold in addition to vendors bringing in their own tables.

#### <u>Aquatic</u>

There are currently 511 children registered in swim lessons. The new SEAPARC pool inflatable slide will be made available to the public during the first week of July with a special swim.

#### Staff

The Program Services Manager recognized employees Elizabeth Olsen, Desirae Meija and Jacklyn Evans, who recently responded to a serious medical incident involving an aqua fit participant. Staff recognized the situation right away, and attended to the participant with confidence, professionalism and great care.

#### <u>Preschool</u>

The Program Services Manager provided an outline of the Doodle Bugs licensed preschool program curriculum with an emphasis on learning through play. She noted that the 2015/16 morning classes are now full with a waitlist in place. Space is still available for the afternoon 4 year old program.

#### Administration

The SEAPARC Manager provided updates on a number of items including:

LED Lighting – An application has been made to the Province of BC's Community Energy Leadership Program for funding assistance.

Parking Lot - Paving repairs and line painting will be occurring over the next few weeks in the parking lot. The rear driveway, around the north end of the building, will now be a one-way only exit from the facility and a new drop-off zone will be created in the area to the north of the main entrance crosswalk, Three wooden light poles no longer in use will also be removed.

Sooke Bike Park – All portions of the bike park are now open for use. A wooden kiosk built by students in the Edward Milne Community School Trades Awareness Skills & Knowledge (TASK) program is being installed. The Bike Park Steering Committee will now shift their focus from development to operations.

#### b) Staff Report - Proposed Fees & Charges 2015/16

The SEAPARC Manager reviewed proposed fee increases and amendments to the Recreation Services and Facilities Fees and Charges Bylaw, effective September 1, 2015. The primary consideration in the annual review of recreation fees and charges is to find a balance between fiscal accountability, access to recreation services, and the marketplace.

Staff recommend the following changes:

#### Pool Lane Rental - Youth

That the Pool Lane Rental Fee – Youth be increased from \$10.50 to \$11.00 in keeping with rates charged by other area facilities.

#### Senior Age Classification

That SEAPARC adjust the senior age classification from 65 to 60. This adjustment would bring the SEAPARC seniors age category into alignment with all other public recreation service providers in the CRD. The financial impact of this change is estimated at approximately \$2000 per year. To offset this cost, SEAPARC would discontinue the annual seniors pass and offer the Lifestyle Pass as the annual option for seniors. This is consistent with comparator organizations. The Lifestyle Pass costs \$38.75 or approximately 10% more than the existing Seniors Pass. Over the 12 month period, the difference in cost would equate to \$3.20 a month.

#### Student Annual Pass (19+)

That the Student (19+) 12 month annual pass be discontinued as this option is not currently being utilized by the user group. The pass was rolled out in September 2013 and since then only one annual pass has been sold. The Lifestyle Pass would be offered as the annual option for students over the age of 19.





#### **PROGRAM SERVICES**

#### New Staff

SEAPARC welcomes Lannette MacLean and Lisa Dear who have been hired as Lifeguard/ Instructors.

#### **Events**

On Saturday, May 23<sup>rd</sup>, SEAPARC hosted an afternoon of Laser Tag & Bumper Balls on the dry floor. Over 70 youth attended. Admission included swimming as well.

On May 9<sup>th</sup> over 100 people attended the Get Your Kids Moving Event, which included a variety of family friendly activities on the dry floor including an inflatable obstacle course and bounce house, as well as pickleball, soccer, floor hockey, bean bag toss & badminton. Prizes, snacks and refreshments were also included. SEAPARC received a \$300 subsidy from the BC Recreation Parks Association to host this event. In addition, SEAPARC hosted a \$2 admission day on Sunday, May 10<sup>th</sup> in honor of Move for Health Day, in partnership with all of the greater Victoria Recreation Centres.

#### <u>Aquatic</u>

Staff are preparing for the annual pool maintenance shutdown, scheduled for June 8-28th.

#### Recreation Programs

SEAPARC has not yet been able to purchase the bus that was approved in the capital budget. To meet the demand of summer camp registration, SEAPARC will be renting a 20 passenger bus, at the cost of \$1550 per month plus taxes, or approximately \$85 per day for July, August and the first week of September. This cost will be covered by registration fees. Renting a bus will allow increased camp registration and more flexibility with camp programming. If the bus is not being adequately used, SEAPARC will be able to cancel the rental at an earlier date with no penalties.

On Friday, May 29<sup>th</sup>, SEAPARC partnered with Journey Middle School and Nolan Riding to offer a short workshop including a brief introduction of the 'why' of dirt jumping and bike park etiquette, as well as basic fundamentals training, and how to ride safely, while increasing skill and confidence. Demonstrations were included as well as opportunities for youth to ride on the park. Nolan Riding will be offering summer dirt jump camps as well. Approximately 120 youth attended.

#### **ADMINISTRATION**

#### National Health & Fitness Day

The first Saturday in June has been designated as National Health and Fitness Day in Canada. The day "is designed as a cohesive response to our alarming rates of childhood obesity and the resultant diabetes, heart and other chronic diseases." Local agencies are being called upon to mark the day with local events celebrating and promoting participation in healthy physical activity (see Appendix A). The SEAPARC Manager seeks the Commission's support of the day/events by way of a motion.

#### School District 62 Joint Use Agreement

The SEAPARC Manager and Program Services Manager met with Harold Cull, School District 62 Secretary Treasurer and Edward Milne Community School Society staff on February 12, 2015 to discuss developing a new Joint Use Agreement. The Agreement has now been drafted and has been forwarded to the School District for review.

#### Strategic Planning Update

David Hewko has been meeting one on one with stakeholders and the Open House was held at SEAPARC on May 26 was very well attended. A final report is expected in June.

#### Canada 150 Community Infrastructure Program

This Canada 150 grant opportunity will invest \$150 million over two years to support projects that are "undertaking meaningful upgrades to existing cultural and community facilities and provide a legacy from Canada 150." Funding of up to \$500,000 is available under the program to fund up to 50% of the total project costs. The SEAPARC Manager is seeking Commission support for the submission of a grant application to assist in the construction of a new multi-purpose facility at SEAPARC.

#### Skate Park Repairs

RADA Resurfacing undertook remediation of the Sooke Skate Park the week of May 25-29. Repairs to the concrete are now complete.

#### Stan Jones Field Remediation

Staff are researching the costs involved in improving the Stan Jones playing surface. The SEAPARC Manager will provide a verbal report at the June meeting.

#### Annual Pool Shutdown

The annual pool shutdown will occur June 8-28, 2015. Planned projects include:

- painting
- parking lot paving and line painting
- pool change room shower wall tiling
- installation of new pool change room showers
- installation of viewing window in Aquatic Programmer's office
- sauna renovation

#### **CLASS Software Replacement**

SEAPARC's registration software will cease to receive support by the developer in 2017. SEAPARC will join the CRD in an RFP process that will investigate replacement of CLASS with a similar product. A capital investment will be required in 2016 to navigate this change. The RFP process will be led by Information Services and is scheduled to being in the fall of 2015. Several benefits are anticipated with new improved software including online registration, marketing tools, and improved reporting.

# STAFF REPORT TO THE SOOKE & ELECTORAL AREA PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION MEETING OF WEDNESDAY, JUNE 3, 2015

**SUBJECT:** Ice Allocation: 2015/16 Season

#### **PURPOSE/ISSUE:**

To recommend ice allocation for the 2015/16 season.

#### **HISTORY/BACKGROUND:**

Staff conducted an Ice Allocation meeting on Tuesday, May 12 to review requests for the 2015-2016 ice season. Meeting notes and proposed ice schedules are attached as background information (Appendix A and B attached).

Dapp's Hockey Challenge hockey school has been allocated ice time from August 30 to September 3, 8:30 am - 4:30 pm. Mr. D'Appolonia initially requested two weeks of ice time beginning August 23. Staff researched costs involved in offering early ice and found it to not be cost effective. Appendix A attached outlines the "ice in" schedule for the week of August. 30 to September 3.

The SEAPARC Manager presented a generic weekly schedule (Appendix A) along with special events and tournament dates. Minor schedule adjustments were discussed with meeting attendees.

At their May 6, 2015 meeting, the Commission approved the Fees & Charges Bylaw for 2015/16. There are no changes in ice rental rates for 2015/16.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

- 1. Approve the generic weekly schedule and recommended adjustments for special events, tournaments and additional game ice for Sooke Minor Hockey.
- 2. Do not approve the schedule and adjustments as presented.

#### **SUMMARY/CONCLUSION:**

The suggested schedule and adjustments offer a fair and consistent allocation of ice time to arena contract users in accordance with Commission policy. The suggested rental rate is consistent with Commission policy and budget approvals. Ice time for the 2015/16 season is booked to near capacity.

#### **RECOMMENDATION(S):**

That the attached generic weekly schedule be approved.

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m.

The proposed ice schedule for the week of August 30-September 3, 2015 was presented. Items of note include:

Dapp's Hockey Challenge request for two weeks of ice time from August 23 to Sept. 3 was discussed. One week of ice time has been scheduled for the week of August 30-Sept. 3, 9am – 3pm. Staff will review feasibility/costs involved in offering early ice and report back to Mr. D'Appolonia. If only one week available, ice request would be modified to begin at 8:30am and end at 4:30pm each day.

The SEAPARC Manager presented the proposed ice schedule for 2015/16. He advised that there were no major changes from 2014/15 other than ice time is now available on Non-Instructional Day mornings. The following requests were made by SMHA President Dee Vivian:

- That a .5 hour of ice time be added to SMHA Sunday afternoon schedule in order to accommodate game times. Staff to consider feasibility of changes to Program Ice and Public Skate ice times.
- That Wednesday and Friday early SMHA ice times be changed from 6-7am to 7-8am.
   Maintenance staff to be consulted on feasibility of changing ice maintenance times.

The SEAPARC Manager spoke to committed dates including tournament bookings and holidays as follows:

#### The SEAPARC Manager reviewed the following:

- No increase in ice rental rates for 2015/16.
- All ice renters must provide proof of insurance. Facility rental insurance is available through the CRD and application forms will be sent out with contracts by the end of June.
- September fees are payable by August 31. A late payment fee of 1.5% monthly will be applied on all accounts overdue after 30 days. All accounts overdue by 60 days may lose their allocated ice time.
- Installation of a "Look Up Line" around the perimeter of the arena ice is being considered.
   Attendees were supportive of installation. Staff to research further.
- Parking lot reconfiguration discussed. New loading/drop off zone to be created to the north of the crosswalk in front of entrance doors. Rear driveway will be converted to one way, exit only road.
- Ice users invited to participate in Strategic Planning Open House being held May 26 from 3-8pm in the SEAPARC lobby.
