#### MUSHROOMS IN THE COMPLEXES

Mushrooms start in the cool, wet weather. Most are pretty and harmless. However, we do get some dangerous mushrooms in BC. If you see a mushroom and aren't completely sure what it is, please leave it alone and tell your caretaker. Deathcap mushrooms are one species of concern and don't look that different to some edible mushrooms. Let your children know never to touch mushrooms except ones from the store!

#### CHRISTMAS FIRE SAFETY

The most dangerous time of the year for household fires is now! Trees are one source of fuel. Make sure your tree is VERY well watered. This helps with needles dropping, clear up AND fire safety. Lights in your home are lovely but check them every year, make sure they meet Canadian standards, and don't buy from places you don't know to be reputable. Don't bunch up wires, put them under anything or otherwise constrict them. Watch for trip hazards! If in doubt, dispose of them responsibly. Cooking is also a risk in the colder months. Don't leave food unattended. People can use more alcohol at this time of year. Being under the influence and doing anything else (smoking, cooking, using tools, putting up decorations) increases risk so minimize risk as much as possible. Candles should never be used in your home. LED versions are available and are very pretty. If you have any questions, talk to your local Fire Department Information team.

CRHC keeps an emergency contact sheet for each tenancy at Fisgard Street. It is really important for us to have this information.
